CROP UPDATES

Cold Pacific storm systems are causing problems for growers in California, Southwestern Desert, Baja, Mexico, and Florida, with systems expected to enter Southwest and Northern Mexico before exiting to the east. Florida faces significant precipitation this week and weekend, impacting growers and crops, with heavy rains threatening strawberries and dry veg crops in the north and south. Read more

WEATHER

<u>Arizona</u> - Yuma expects frost or freeze conditions from Tuesday-Wednesday, with warmer temperatures on Thursday morning due to cloudiness and light rain. Highs in mid-50s to low 60s.

<u>California</u> - Temperatures will remain below average through midweek, with morning lows in the mid-30s and daytime highs in the 50s to 60s. Light rain may occur on Wednesday, but temperatures will return to Monday's levels on Thursday night.

<u>Florida</u> - On Tuesday, Northern and Central FL will experience moderate to heavy rains and strong gusty winds due to a cold front, with increased rain chances in northern Florida and central/southern Florida.

<u>Mexico</u> - The forecast predicts cool mornings and mostly seasonal daytime temperatures through Friday, with a possible cold front by Saturday. Lows are in the 30s-40s, highs in the 60s-70s.

FREIGHT

Shipper delays due to lettuce ice is expected all week and into next.

Truck capacity is returning to normal post-holiday.

Apples

The overall supply of apples remains robust. Market movement is generally good, and prices will remain stable at lower levels. The Pink Lady's might get tight in a few months due to a frost at harvest time, but at the moment there are plenty.

<u>Asparagus</u>



Consistucion and Loreto in southern Baja are the last areas to produce asparagus and Sonora and northern Baja are just starting to produce. Caborca remains Sonora's largest region. The past 7-10 days have seen scattered showers in the valley, preventing cutting and burning as planned. This has only caused further delays. Additionally, the temperatures are very cold with highs of mid-60°F and lows of mid-30°F, which are not helpful for asparagus production. Until any form of supply can offset the current lack of supply, Mexican asparagus prices will remain high. Weather may delay this until late January or early February. Increasing heat and decreasing quality are also limiting asparagus from Peru at this time of year. Lack of supply from Mexico has caused others to look to Peru for supplemental supply, increasing pressure on already limited production. In Peru, yields remain low due to hot weather, with highs in the low-90°F range and lows in the mid-60°F range, which is too hot for asparagus. There are also scattered showers, which complicate matters further.

Weather Updates



CALIFORNIA

Despite not being as cold as Monday, temperatures will remain below average through midweek. The morning lows will be in the low-mid 30s, and the daytime highs will be in the low 50s to low 60s. There will be a slight chance of light rain Wednesday as a low pressure system approaches, but temperatures will fall back to Mon's levels with upper 20s to mid 30s area wide on Thursday night. Despite the next system passing near the area Saturday, any rain that falls will be less than ½".



MEXICO

Through Friday, it will be cool in the mornings and mostly seasonal in the daytime. A cold front may move toward the region by Saturday, bringing slightly cooler temperatures. Lows will be in the upper 30s to upper 40s most days through Saturday. The highs will be in the upper 60s to upper 70s through the weekend. Through Jan 13, rain chances will remain low, with mostly dry weather expected.



FLORIDA

Tuesday, much of Northern and Central FL will experience moderate to heavy rains and strong gusty winds due to a strong cold front. The Florida Panhandle will experience rain overnight on Monday and Tuesday, with rain chances increasing over northern Florida in the morning and in the afternoon and evening on Tuesday over central/southern Florida. During Tuesday's day, gusty winds of 35 to 45 mph are expected, while by Wednesday and Thursday, gusts will be closer to 20 mph.



ARIZONA

In and around Yuma, widespread frost or freeze conditions are expected Tuesday-Wednesday. In the I-10 corridor and southeast California, Thursday morning should be noticeably warmer due to increasing cloudiness associated with a low that may bring light rain. There will be near-to-below freezing lows for most fields on Friday and Saturday. Highs in the mid 50s to low 60s Tuesday afternoon, warming a few degrees Wednesday. A lengthy period of 25-30mph gusts is expected from Wednesday through Thursday, as light northeasterly winds Tuesday shift southerly Wednesday, then strengthen and shift westerly late Wednesday through Thursday.

Grop Appdates

Mother Nature continues to cause havoc for growers from California and the Southwestern Desert regions to Baja, Mexico and Florida as a series of cold Pacific storm systems look to roll in from the west into the weekend. This continues the train of storm systems moving in from the Pacific Ocean over the past week or so. These systems will dive into the Southwest and Northern Mexico with very cold temperatures before exiting to the east.

As these systems move to the east significant precipitation is once again expected across Florida this week and into the weekend. This region has been impacted by numerous weather events this season and the recent heavy rains will not help supplies as growers look to increase production. Many crops remain in the line of fire from strawberries in the north to dry veg crops (tomatoes, peppers, squash, beans, cucumbers etc.) to the south.

Forecasts bring very cold temperatures to Northern Mexico and the Southwestern Desert growing regions this week into the weekend with frost and lettuce ice conditions expected. This round of cold temperatures is expected to be some of the coldest of the season and more widespread than previous cold temperatures. While blister and epidermal peel will certainly impact quality in many leafy green stands, overall extended cold temperatures will also slow overall growth rates of all crops in the region. Along with blister and epidermal peel you can expect to see lighter color and carton weights and smaller head sizes as growers trim out damaged outer leaves. The tender spinach and spring mix items will also take a hit with the expected cold temperatures impacting yields, texture and shelf life of these products.

On a positive note, growers have plenty of acreage planted which will allow them some choices in harvests depending on damage in the fields. Long range forecast models show a high-pressure ridge building out west that will push the storm track well to the north next week. This will allow for some warming in the desert locals next week.

At this point we will have to wait and see how the various regions on both coasts come through the storm systems and growers have time to assess crop damage. Overall supplies look to remain light with growers hoping for warmer weather to help growth rates and quality in the various regions.
